The value of peer learning at BWSR Academy

On November 1-3 the annual BWSR Academy was held at Cragun's Conference Center in Brainerd, Minnesota. With 450 attendees and 63 sessions over the three day period there were plenty of opportunities for learning and networking.

The goal during each academy year is to provide high-quality training for the local government staff who maintain and improve the delivery of conservation work in Minnesota.

The BWSR Academy focuses on providing relevant, cost-effective training to our partners that can be applied directly to their work.

A key to the academy delivery model is the use of peers to provide training during sessions.

Jenny Gieseke, Organizational Effectiveness Manager for BWSR explained, "The value of peers delivering training during academy is their experience is firsthand. They are experts in their field and they're able to take that everyday experience and translate it for their audience. It adds legitimacy to the training and often creates an environment for real world problem solving."

This type of learning also awarded me the chance in my training session to share ideas and experiences with fellow SWCD and watershed district employees to use for similar conservation projects and issues."
